

GET TO KNOW ED SCHIRNER





Mr. Schirner does everything that an educator today is asked to do. He provides knowledge and skills applicable to students in their real life setting and reaches everyone from the student who wants to learn basic car ownership to the student who wants to turn this into a [career]. Ed teaches by example. Without even knowing it, students first learn to take care of their materials and tools and keep a clean and organized workspace. From there, he meets the student where they are. There is no question that students will master the intended curriculum by the time the course ends. The trick comes in what to do with the students who arrive already knowing that curriculum; Mr. Schirner naturally differentiates instruction to ensure each student is personally invested and learning something new every day.

Mr. Schirner is a natural teacher. He doesn't take tools out of a student's hand to do it for them. He works alongside them and guides them through the necessary steps to complete the task. In a work-based setting, the automotive industry requires collaboration and coordination. Ed provides that in the classroom and in the competitions the students enter. One of the more impressive aspects of the program is the variety of vehicles the students learn on. From a simple six-cylinder engine to a modern electric vehicle, students emerge from this program with a wide array of industry-relevant practical knowledge. Ed takes the students beyond mechanics to include the business side of the automotive industry as well. Students who participate in this program have the opportunity to compete, earn certifications, and broaden their skill set into the aspect of the industry that most appeals to them.

As incredible as the program is, students would not gravitate to it but for the charismatic personality of Mr. Schirner. Some students are very intimidated by the course, but Mr. Schirner makes the students feel welcome and provides opportunities for them to experience success.
