Opening Business

Second Vice Chair Cindy Davis called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. She read the following statement: As authorized by Utah Code 52-4, this meeting is being held electronically without an anchor location to reduce the risk to health and safety from COVID-19 by limiting the frequency of in-person meetings.

Meeting Minutes

MOTION was made by Vice Chair Belnap and seconded that the Board approve the minutes of its January 28, 2021 meeting.

Motion carried; Members Cannon, Hansen, Huntsman, and Lear absent.

Review of Legislation

Deputy Superintendent Angie Stallings and Director of Public Affairs Jeffrey Van Hulten reviewed the following bills: 1st Substitute S.B. 131 Public Education Building Standards and Process; S.B. 184 School Assessment and Accountability Amendments; H.B. 340 Mathematics and Science Opportunities for Students and Teachers Program; 1st Substitute H.B. 124 Civics Engagement Pilot Program Amendments; and S.B. 75 Special Education Least Restrictive Requirement Amendments.

Budget Priorities

Deputy Superintendent Scott Jones and USBE Fiscal Analyst Dale Frost gave a progress report on the Board's funding request. They reviewed a comparison between the Board's budget request, the Public Education Appropriations Subcommittee request, and the Governor's request.

Action on Legislation

MOTION was made by Member Moss and seconded that the Board support H.B. 42 Education Agency Report Process Amendments.

Member Moss spoke to the motion, voicing that a look at the impact of a required report to a local education agency (LEA) would be an important element in the reporting process and provide fairness for LEAs. It was also noted that the bill eliminates some reports.

Other members questioned the necessity of the bill considering the Board's efforts currently taking place to eliminate and streamline reporting and cautioned that adding another requirement in the process may slow down that work.

Motion failed, with Members Boothe, Cline, Earl, Hart, Hymas, and Moss in favor, and Members Belnap, Cannon, Hansen, Huntsman, Lear, Norton, and Strate opposed; Vice Chair Davis abstained.

MOTION was made by Member Strate and seconded that the Board oppose S.B. 131 State Facility Energy Efficiency Amendments.

Member Strate spoke to the importance of local control and flexibility in the building of schools to reflect learning models and community needs.

Other members expressed that for high-growth areas a three-year plan is not reasonable, and that the work would require something equivalent of a building department and take the focus off other important work of the Board.

Motion carried unanimously.

Adjournment
