Special Populations Best Practice – Out-of-Workforce Individuals

As we continue to highlight evidence-based practices, this month we highlight the special population of out-of-workforce individuals. Out-of-workforce individuals are defined as, "A person who has primarily worked without pay, caring for family members, who is unemployed or underemployed, and who is experiencing difficulty in obtaining or upgrading employment." Out-of-workforce individuals are a focus for postsecondary institutions.

In these evidence-based practices, strategies to work with out-of-workforce individuals include:

- Working with state and local agencies and departments to coordinate with employer groups to understand the causes of unemployment, workforce needs, and career opportunities.
- Work-based learning and job placement strategies targeted to out-of-workforce individuals to improve on necessary job skills, knowledge, and abilities.
- Flexible learning environments and experiences that enable out-of-workforce individuals to take Career and Technical Education courses and manage their home responsibilities.

Annika: Future Physician Assistant



"CTE courses are the perfect way to explore career paths! Take CTE courses in multiple different subjects and take as many as you can. You may take a class in something you didn't think was interesting, but after learning more about it you can realize that you actually love it. Taking courses in different subjects can also open up new opportunities that you didn't know existed and can end up being some of the best parts of high school. The more CTE courses you take the further ahead you place yourself on your career path. Getting high school credit for exploring career options is one of the best opportunities."

"For future students entering high school, my advice is simple, explore as many CTE courses as you can. These courses give you a hands-on look at different fields, helping you figure out what you might be interested in for your future career or college major. I highly recommend completing at least one CTE Pathway—a series of related courses in a specific area. This experience not only gives you practical skills but also helps you navigate your academic and career choices. Personally, I wouldn't have discovered my passion for culinary arts if I hadn't taken these classes. So, my advice is to take advantage of CTE courses, complete a pathway, and let these experiences guide your path forward."
