Curriculum Adoption and Evaluation Tools

[Recommended Instructional Materials System \(RIMS\): Searchable Database](#) - The Utah State Board of Education provides state recommendation of instructional materials to provide the stakeholders with reviews of core-related materials and to eliminate instructional materials that violate Utah Administrative Code or Utah State Board Rules.

[Open Educational Resources \(OER\) Rubric](#) - These rubrics help teachers determine the degree of alignment between OER materials and social studies standards.

[Rubric to Evaluate the Quality of Units in Social Studies](#) - This rubric helps teachers and districts evaluate the quality of instructional units in social studies and is modeled after the EQUIP (Educators Evaluating the Quality of Instructional Products) rubric in ELA/Literacy, Mathematics, and Science.
