

2019 Utah CTE Video Contest

Utah CTE is accepting entries for student created videos.

Who: The contest is open to secondary CTE students. Students can enter individually or as a group.

What: Create a short video (45 to 90 seconds) highlighting what you are learning in your CTE classes, CTSOs, work-based learning experiences, CTE Internship, or in CTE concurrent enrollment classes.

When: Entries accepted now through Monday, March 4, 2019.

Why: Videos will be featured on the Utah CTE Month webpage and via social media to promote CTE programs throughout Utah.

How: Upload your video to YouTube and submit the URL to UtahCTE@schools.utah.gov. Complete contest details at UtahCTE.org.

Prize: First place \$300. Second place \$125. Third place \$75.

Entries Due: Monday, March 4, 2019. Winners will be announced Monday, April 8, 2019.



Contest Rules and Guidelines

All Entries Must:

- Be 45 to 90 seconds.
- Incorporate the CTE logo.
 - The CTE logo can be obtained from a CTE teacher in your school.
 - The [Authorized User's Guide](#) for the CTE brand should be reviewed before placing the logo in your video.
- Incorporate the full name of "Career and Technical Education" and not only the acronym CTE.
- Incorporate the tagline "CTE: Learning that works for Utah."
- Rated appropriate for ALL school audiences.
- Use music that is original or licensed to use and publish. Copyright-free, royalty-free, and Creative Commons music is accepted. Attribute original author in credits.

Video Should:

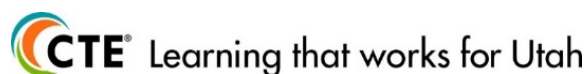
- Be technically well-produced and suitable for sharing on the Internet.
- Engage and inform about CTE.
- Highlight what you are learning in your CTE classes, CTSOs, work-based learning experiences, CTE Internship, or in CTE concurrent enrollment classes.
- Show that CTE is rigorous, has relevance, and teaches skills.
- Show that CTE prepares students for education and training beyond high school and leads to a successful career.
- Show the value of CTE in preparing students for careers that are part of the economic development of the state of Utah.

Judging

- Entries will be judged on composition and content by a panel of CTE judges.
