



# PUBLIC EDUCATION SUMMARY General Session of the Utah Legislature



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### Foreword

This publication represents the combined effort of staff members at the Utah State Office of Education (USOE). It is intended to be a single-source review of educationrelated legislation from the 2015 Legislative Session. This publication is written for state school board members, local education agency (LEA) board members, superintendents, charter school administrators, and school business administrators. It may also be useful to other public education-related organizations and to state legislators.

The main body of the publication reviews each education-related bill that was passed and identifies action that might be taken by the Utah State Board of Education (USBE) and local district and charter school boards to implement the requirements of the legislation. The publication also contains summary information on funding and bills not passed.

This publication is a service of the Utah State Office of Education, but is not intended to convey any specific direction or assignments for action by the local education agencies. Such requirements, if needed, will come directly from the Office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. This publication is also not intended as a formal legal opinion or interpretation of legislative action.

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### 2015 Legislative General Session Fiscal Highlights

#### Total Public Education Budget: \$4,370,769,600

Total Minimum School Program (MSP) Funding: \$3,597,924,400, a 7.09% increase from FY 2015.

<u>Growth and Weighted Pupil Unit (WPU): 4% Increase</u> The Utah State Board of Education requested funding of actual growth to be added to the base budget and an increase of 2.5% in the value of the WPU. Growth was fully funded in MSP programs; additionally, the value of the WPU was increased by 4.0%.

**Enrollment Growth: 54,406,600 Ongoing** Included in the enrollment growth total is \$5,771,700 that represents funding for the extension of the provision of funding a charter school based on the higher of either the October 1 enrollment of the current year or its ADM in the prior year plus growth. Enrollment growth was funded for an estimated increase of 7,922 students next year.

<u>Voted and Board Local Levy Programs Increase</u> The guarantee for the Voted and Board Local Levy Programs increased from \$27.92 to \$33.27 per .0001 of tax rate.
